Red Tail Ready For ECI

DEVENS, Mass. – While the weather in the Northeast has yet to cooperate, players, fans, officials and Red Tail Golf Club in central Massachusetts are certainly ready to go for next week's ECI. Devens is set to host top players from around the country for the eighth year in a row and the tournament, entering its ninth year, is showing no signs of changing venues for the 10-year anniversary in 2012.

"They have been so good to us over the years," said Co-tournament chairman Marc Zirolli in his state of the ECI address last week from The Fours Restaurant in downtown Boston. "It's such a great venue to host our championship. The fans love coming out, and the players really enjoy the golf."

Red Tail superintendent Pat Lange is pleased with the way the course conditions have been improving throughout the spring despite the weather.

"It's been cold, so aesthetically the golf course doesn't look as pretty and in full bloom as it usually does this time of year, but we've had some rain, so the greens and fairways are pretty lush. Our staff is working hard to get the golf course ready for another ECI."

As always, a number of players come in looking to win this coveted title. Brian Gill rebounded from a tough start to make three birdies on the back nine last year en route to the 2-over par championship crown. Gill feels confident he's going to play well next weekend.

"You try and peak for the big events," said Gill via a phone interview last week from his home in Connecticut. "I've been working hard this Spring to peak for a number of important golf tournaments in the coming weeks." Gill starts with the ECI on Sunday, then will play in the CT PGA Assistants Championship in June, and will hope to qualify for the Travelers Championship after the US Open.

"This golf course is a great test for major championship golf. I love the shots you have to hit here."

Nick Turczak and John Dailey return in hopes of another ECI title, while others like Ken Tessier, Alex Lawner, Matt Gajda, Matt Barnes, and Justin McLear have been close in the past, and would desperately love a win. Many call Tessier the best player in the field without a title. Ken tries to ignore those claims.

"You can't think about that kind of stuff when you're out here," says Tessier. "If you do, you're going to be in big trouble. I just need to go play my own game next weekend."

ECI rookie Jerry Miceli received a sponsor's exemption this year and hopes to make the best of his appearance. The Paul Casey look-a-like is a solid player with tons of length and consistency off the tee. ECI Week kicks off today, including a slew of events for fans and players that run through Saturday. 
Josh Clark:
