## Lisbon Historical Society Quarterly Notes

Summer is waning; the fall harvest is upon us. The John Bishop House will participate once again in the Lisbon Fall Festival, with open hearth cooking and a bake sale fundraiser. Save the date: Saturday, September 20.

On Saturday, October 25 at 7 p.m. at the Lisbon Community Center Barn, the Lisbon Historical Society is hosting a presentation by the Northeast Paranormal Investigations Society (NPIS) for a mysterious evening program and a history lesson you will not forget! NPIS entertains and shares ghostly results from the team's investigations, from Gettysburg, to Maine, including Lisbon's newly acquired historic Burnham Tavern and the John Bishop House. Admission is \$10 for adults and \$5 for children, proceeds supports the Burnham Tavern restoration project.

The Historical Society received the good news in early June that the Burnham Tavern is now listed on the State of Connecticut's Register of Historic Places. We expect the National Park Service to take up our application for the National Register of Historic Places listing shortly. Among

the many benefits the listing affords is the opportunity and ability to apply for restoration grants. The Historical Society, through its Burnham Tavern Development Committee, has been working diligently to establish a restoration and development plan. Our first priority is to stabilize the structure, remove 21st century additions and protect the 18th century stenciling on interior walls.

Congratulations go out to Chris Arpin, this year's recipient of the Lisbon Historical Society's Excellence in History Award.

Cans and bottles redemption efforts continue. Donations in original packaging or cardboard boxes are extremely helpful and as always, the Lisbon Historical Society is grateful for your donations no matter how they come.



# Town Historian Quarterly Report

I was looking at a 1868 map of Lisbon/Jewett City and enlarged it to look at it more closely and noted that there was an area to the right side of the map along what would presently be the cross road or Newent Road which connects Rt. 12 to Rt. 169. Near the middle of the map were the words "Read Homestead." Also noted were the words "Saw and Shingle Mill" across the road from a pond and near the Read Haskell Cemetery.

I became curious to see if I could find any information regarding the saw/shingle mill. I was able to locate the name of the owner at that time as TG Read: Thomas Goddard Read. TG Read was married to Emily Williams and they had nine children. Mr. Read lived from April 7, 1803 to November 5, 1887.

I then became curious as to what information I might be able to find out regarding this man, his family and who he descended from. He was the youngest of twelve children of Amos, a traveling Baptist minister, and Mary/Mercy Bennett from Scituate, RI. Amos Read had two wives but only Mary birthed his children.

Amos Read lived from March 25, 1756 to November 2, 1838. His father was Joseph Read and he was married to Thankful Andrus (Andrews). To their union were born seven children. Amos was the youngest child. They were members of the Newent Congregational Church. Joseph lived from 1709 to 1783.

Joseph Read was a

descendent of Joseph and Marcy Guppie. To their union were born seven children. He was married a total of four times (Marcy Guppie, Patience Rogers, Tabitha Herrick, and Mary Henn.).

Joseph Read's parents were Josiah Reed and Grace Holloway. Joseph Read lived from 1680 to 1775. In reading some of the biography regarding this Joseph Read I learned that he was granted land at Pupie Hill and purchased 100 acres from John Perkins. This is now known as North Burnham Highway. He also purchased land "on ye hill called Pabaquamsq." I am not sure where this hill/road might have been. It was also documented that in 1735 Joseph Read sold seven acres on Puffiov Hill to Richard Kimball. Multiple land exchanges were also documented in a Read/Reed history in the September 2007 Connecticut Nutmegger magazine.

This curiosity about the Reed/Read's began when I started to search for the Inn/Tavern that was owned by a member of the Read family. I have found the tavern sign which is at the Connecticut Historical Society and a brief writing about the sign says: "Inns like the Joseph Read III in Lisbon, Connecticut, not only provided food, drink, shelter, and entertainment for colonial Americans but were also arenas for debating political issues. The sign with its circular yellow orb (sun) over a pine tree, may have been intended as a veiled reference to the Sons of Liberty, an extralegal resistance organization that had adopted as its symbol the Liberty Tree. The date of 1769 coincided with the British enactment of the Townshend Acts, which ignited a new wave of colonial resistance to British rule." The sign also has the words "Entertainment for Man & Hors" and is dated 1768. I am certain this Joseph Read is not one of the above gentleman but that is still to be determined.


