FY 2017-18 Budget

Last year, the State of Connecticut cut the grants that they give Lisbon each year.

In anticipation of further cuts from the State for next year's budget, FY2017-18, the Board of Finance asked that both the General Government Budget and the Board of Education Budget be kept at a zero percent increase.

The proposed State Budget by the Governor, released in February, cuts grants to Lisbon by \$1.8 million, which is an astronomical figure. Last year the Governor proposed \$1.3 million in cuts but the legislature restored all but \$370,000. So, the hope is the \$2 million figure will not hold. Nevertheless, it is anticipated that a significant cut will remain.

Therefore, it is extra important to follow the budget process this year and to make your opinions known at the March 15 meeting and the public

hearing on March 29.

Housing Rehabilitation Program 0% Interest Loans

A Small Cities Grant-Town of Lisbon



Does your roof or plumbing leak? Does your heating system leave you cold? The Town of Lisbon's Housing Rehabilitation Loan program can help you make these repairs with no out of pocket expenses.

The Town of Lisbon has been awarded a Housing Rehabilitation Grant with the State of Connecticut's Department of Housing and applications are now being accepted for the program.

Time is of the essence as the grant expires September, 2017. Approximately 7 more families can be served and applicants are served on a first-come, first-serve basis.

The program, sponsored by HUD (Housing and Urban Development), provides INTEREST FREE - DEFERRED PAYMENT HOME IMPROVEMENT LOANS to qualified low and moderate income residents. The loans are not due and payable until the home is sold.

Examples of eligible repairs are: roof and window replacement, lead paint removal, electrical & heating system upgrades, code corrections, failed septic systems and handicap accessibility.

Eligible applicants must 1) be up to date on property taxes; 2) have 10% equity in the home; and 3) be low or moderate income by HUD standards.

THE PROGRAM REQUIRES NO OUT OF POCKET EXPENSES.

Historic Places and the only one of its kind left in Connecticut. Built in 1936, the fifteen original founding families were Russian and Polish immigrants. Join us to learn their story and the history of the Anshei Israel Synagogue, a refuge in the country.

Lisbon's earliest immigrants came from Newent, England, by way of Ipswich, Massachusetts, in the late 1600s. Farmers and tradesmen, gradually displaced the native peoples occupying the land between the rivers. German families recruited in the 1880s by a representative of the cotton mill in Baltic to work in the mill established the German Shooting Club in 1893 to promote social life, welfare, and rife shooting. Jews fleeing growing anti-Jewish sentiments and persecution in Eastern Europe and Russia during a period from the late 1800s through the early 1900s migrated to eastern Connecticut and Lisbon. Here they had the ability to own land and to farm, a right denied in their home countries. During the turn of the century Polish immigrants escaping revolution in Eastern Europe worked in the mills, many became farmers. In 1930, the Polish Citizens Club and others developed the first recreation park in Lisbon on the east side of Blissville Pond. Polonia Park held dances, fairs, and events until 1955.1

The Burnham Tavern does not have any scheduled preservation projects during the winter months, however, grant applications are in the works. Several society members are collaborating on a State Historic Preservation grant to fund items identified in the Conditions and Assessment Report and we made it through the first round of the Connecticut Trust for Historic Preservation step-based application process for the 1772 Foundation grant.

International corporations continue to add smaller craft breweries to their inventory, which adds new labels to CT redemptions. As long as CT is somewhere on the label or top the bottle or can is good. Gatorade, Snapple, tea beverages, wine bottles, plastic milk jugs, and all others that do not have "CT" in the list of states on the container are not redeemable, those items should be disposed of via our town-wide blue bin recycling program. Many thanks go out to our contributors, sorters, and especially Ken Mahler who administers and organizes the program.

Living Museums

The Colonial and Federal Periods of American History can be seen in numerous historic homes and living history museums, colonies, and plantations in New England. You can learn how people lived, where their food came from, their modes of transportation and how difficult it was to live in those respective years.

There was no technology, no rapid modes of transportation, and no quick means of contacting family even if you sent a letter by the U.S. Post Office. Most families made their own clothing by hand stitching them and they usually only had one or two sets of clotheswork and church clothes. Furniture was made by hand tools as factories hadn't emerged yet. Food was preserved when harvested from the gardens, orchards, and woods. They preserved as much as they could by drying, smoking, and keeping food in dirt or root cellars. They raised animals for food such as cows, pigs, chickens, ducks, turkeys, or hunted the woods for squirrel, pheasant, rabbit, deer, and such.

They were adept at killing and cleaning the food and using as much of the carcass as possible for clothing, rendering lard, casing for foods, and using the sweet meats. Bones may have been used for eating utensils and

other items requiring a handle once they were dried and hardened. Furniture would have been made by hand out of tree boards and may have been very simple in design and we all know some of the handmade furniture is very elaborate and precisely made. Many people made due with what they had, borrowed, or made for their families.

The majority of homes were very simple if there was little money to live on and was needed more for church tithing than furniture. Homes were usually one or possibly two rooms and all of the family needs were met in this living area, for cooking, eating, reading, sewing, and visiting.

PLYMOUTH PLANTATION in Plymouth, Massachusetts, is a great place to see and learn about early living with various homes depicting the way of life for various incomes and abilities. They have small one and two room houses where they worked and slept. The first Englanders who came to live here did not have places to purchase their necessities as there were no established businesses.

The costumed players speak as the Pilgrims did and speak of their difficulty living in the new land after they came to "New" England. You can also visit the outdoor living museum exhibit of the Wampanoag Indians home site to see how the Indians lived and taught the Pilgrims how to plant their crops, fish, hunt, gather the herbs and berries, and how to make matts and baskets.

The Indian descendants who currently live there dress in accurate clothing made of deer skin. They will teach you their traditions, stories, music and dance of the tribes. They will allow you to go through their various "homes" and show you how they lived then and now.

There are many homes in Plymouth that give you an idea of various styles of

homes such as the Mayflower Society House, the Daniel Webster home, a sea captain's home, a grist mill, and other homes from the mid to late 1700's to the mid 1800's pre Civil War.

OLD STURBRIDGE VILLAGE is a living museum located in Sturbridge, Massachusetts. This museum on over 200 acres will show you how they lived from the 1790's to 1830's. You will learn of the many trades and skills of the time and the tools that were used to create products for home use and in the fields and businesses. There is a carding mill to prepare wool for spinning, a grist mill for grinding grains for cooking and feeding animals, and a saw mill for cutting wood to build homes and furniture. The mills were all run on water power.

They have various levels of homes to show how homes were built. There are one story and two story homes from very simple to very expensive. There is a Parsonage, a prosperous farmer's home, a home that features textile production, one for family and children highlights, and a farm with house, barn, outbuildings and fields.

Trades people who are featured are the blacksmith shop, the cooper shop, the tin shop, printing office, shoe shop, and the pottery shop. The cider mill, sawmill, and carding mill all run using water power as the source of power to run their machines.

There are churches for the Quakers, and a meetinghouse for the town meetings, elections, lectures, and political events. There is also is a lawyer's office, a country store, a bank, a school, and many homes of citizens that would have lived in this era. There is a tavern for refreshments, the town pound to confine animals found roaming, a stage coach that will take you around the village, contd pg. 8

and over a covered bridge.

They also have products for sale that are made in the village, a gift shop to purchase items related to the village, and a book sales area to get ideas on how to build, cook, learn, make, grow, preserve, and books on periods of history.

They have museums of firearms, glass types of blown, molded and pressed glass objects. There is a lighting museum of oil lamps, candles, and lighting lamps used at different times in the village. There are herb, flower, and vegetable gardens for cooking, medicine, crafts, and items used for dying cloths.

They also advertise various topics and interesting subjects with regard to living in the early 19th century that are interesting to the young and old or to those who just have a curiosity to see what they might have missed if they were living in that era.

Next time I will write about Historic Deerfield in Deerfield Massachusetts and Strawberry Banke Museum in Portsmouth New Hampshire, and Colonial Williamsburg in Virginia. All of these places are locations where you can go back in time and see what you might have missed or would like to recreate for a simpler life today. They make good destinations for vacation for one and all.
