

Only three families, Bishop, Browne, and Bradlaw owned the 200-year old property before acquisition by the town. The house is virtually unchanged since the day it was built, of the seven fireplaces, five are fully functional including the kitchen fireplace and bake oven. You may be surprised to find open hearth cooking in progress during a Saturday visit.

June events include the annual Lisbon Central School field trip to the Bishop House. We expect forty eager 5th graders, teachers, and chaperones that will have a full day of open hearth cooking combined with a history lesson about life in the early 1800s.

This past April, the Historical Society hosted a group of visitors from the Greater Hartford Jewish Historical Society at the Anshei Israel Synagogue, located on Newent Road. Ken Mahler

gave a presentation on the history of the synagogue, the congregation and the town's acquisition of the property. Special guest, Irene Zuckerbraun, a former congregant, took questions from the visitors. If not for the late Dr. Albert Gosselin and Jerome Zuckerbraun and the leadership of the town of Lisbon, we might not have this significant historic building or the stories of our Jewish immigrants. In addition to the tour group, the synagogue opening was part of The Last Green Valley's 2017 Spring Outdoors program. Total visitor participation for the day was 43.

On an overcast day in May, Ken and Christine Mahler, Kevin Shafer and Kim and Mark Sperry tackled the job of hauling and chipping brush and downed trees to open up the Monarch butterfly stopover field at the Burnham Tavern. Because caterpillars can eat nothing but milkweed, the plant is crucial to the survival of the species. The milkweed flowers are also a food source for bees.

Many thanks go to our contributors, sorters, and especially Ken Mahler who administers and organizes the can and bottle redemption program. As long as CT is somewhere on the label or top of the bottle or can, it is good. Women's Volleyball League

The 14th Season of the Lisbon Recreation Women's Volleyball League began on Tuesday, September 13, 2016, with 18 teams - 17 returning and 1 new - participating in pre-season skills & drills clinic. Official match play began on 9.27.16. The weekly match format includes each of the 18 teams, averaging 8 players each, competing in a 3 game match following a season schedule prepared by League Program Director, Nancy Smigiel. The Program Director oversees the weekly evening matches while League Referees officiate each match.

Upon completion of weekly matches, games scores are recorded to maintain League standings, which are shared with League Captains and participants via e-mail and League Facebook page. This is a very popular page as a great number of the participating teams are sponsored by local businesses! At the completion of 5 weeks of head-to-head match play and based upon standings, divisions are adjusted in advance of the new 5-week schedule. Regular season match play continues for a total of 20 weeks and is followed by a position night, quarterfinal, semi-final, and league divisional final matches.

More Living Museums

Historic Deerfield was founded in Old Deerfield, MA in 1952 and is an outdoor museum that focuses on the history of the Connecticut River Valley and early New England. They interpret 300 years of history and describe life with the diversity of living with Indians, many immigrants, and slaves to that region. They also display use of farmland, gardens, common plants to the area, a restaurant, and a gift shop, and a book store. They also display open hearth cooking classes.

They have 12 guided and self-guided tours of houses dating from 1730 to 1850. Eleven of the houses are on their original site or foundation. Most of the houses are within close proximity for walking and taking in the tour of each house or property. Some are private buildings but the architecture of the exterior can be admired and a time frame of its build can be determined.

You can visit a woodworking apprentice's shop, an Inn built in 1814 that can be stayed in, learn of the life of a farming family, see furnishings of a Connecticut Valley home, see how a very prosperous person lived in luxury of the time and see antiques, needlework, ironware, and bakery.

Deerfield was founded in 1673. In 1704, the village was raided by French Troops and Native Americans. Fifty-six Deerfield residents were killed and 109 captured. Those 109 people were marched north to Canada and only 89 survived the trip.

Strawberry Banke in Portsmouth, NH, is an outdoor living museum on 10 acres of land with historic buildings, interactive exhibits and gardens. In addition, there

are historic homes outside of the Bankes museum that can be seen for a cost. This can be checked on the internet for the homes and museums off of the Strawberry Banke site. Home structures on the museum site range in date from 1695 which is the Sherburne House that demonstrates house construction of the time. A majority of the houses were built in the late 1790's and early 1800's. You can see wooden boat building, furniture, ceramics, textiles, glass, tools, works of art, coopering, use of herbs, a family run grocery store. There are chicken coops, fruit and vegetable gardens, a seasonal skating rink, and orchards. contd. pg 9

As with the majority of programs run by the Recreation Committee, participant registration fees cover operating costs. These fees and coinciding non-resident fees, are collected by the Program Director, and turned into the Town Treasurer. Program operating expenses are presented for approval at monthly Recreation Committee meetings. Any unused funds generated by these successful Recreation Committee run programs like the Women's Volleyball League, remain in the Town of Lisbon General Fund. A financial report and equipment inventory is prepared by the Program Director and presented to the Recreation Committee upon conclusion of each program.

That is no denying that the sport of volleyball has gained steadily in popularity through the years. Due in part to the success of the Women's League, the Recreation Committee has been able to provide and maintain court equipment, which is also used by the students of Lisbon Central School. Many of these students have gone on to play with knowledge and confidence on their high school and college teams. It is the hope of the Recreation Committee to continue to provide opportunities for the youth and adults of this community through strong, viable and financially self-sufficient programs like this one.

There also have been archaeologists that have done research and recovered items from the soil and from donations that have made it possible to depict life in this area over 300 plus years with relative accuracy. These are all items that depict life in Portsmouth and the museum site. They have been able to document maritime activities, diet, agricultural practices, and domestic life. Archaeology has helped the museum to reconstruct wharves, gardens, road, pathways and learned how to transitions from farmers to tradesmen to merchants lived from the 1600's. Food grown at the museum is used to cook in the hearth cooking programs.

In my next writing I will let you know about Colonial Williamsburg Virginia where you can spend a week and never see all the sites of the historic area going back to the settlement in Williamsburg, Jamestown, Yorktown, and many other areas of the surrounding area.


