Many thanks go out to contributors to our can and bottle redemption program. Ken Mahler, who administers and organizes the can and bottle program, says that as long as CT is somewhere on the label, the bottle, or can is redeemable. Poland Springs water bottles with the red strip around the label, Gatorade, Snapple, tea beverages, wine bottles, plastic milk jugs, and all others that do not have CT in the list of states are recyclable and should be disposed of in your home blue bin for weekly pickup. Additionally, it is impossible for the bar code readers at the redemption centers to process crushed aluminum cans and plastic bottles. We do our best to pop bottles back in to shape but those we cannot, and the crushed cans, subsequently end up in the recycling bins and over the year that amounts to a lot of lost nickels.



Quarterly Newsletter Notes from the Town Historian

Colonial American pets were brought from Europe. They may have been dogs, cats, or farm animals.

They served dual purposes of workers and pets. By the 1700's traditional pets were okay but many were developing a fondness for adopting and taming wild animals which were deer, squirrels, wild birds, mice and more.

From an article "Out of this Century" by Ben Miller, squirrels were the favorite for a pet and were entertaining pets. If they were removed from their nest at an early age they were easy to tame. According to Mr. Miller's research numerous period paintings had leashed or collared squirrels on near their young owners. The gray or flying squirrels were so tame they would follow the children everywhere. They had one bad habit of chewing woolen garments and had to have special cages with metal bars to house them. Some owners noted that the squirrels would rum on an exercise wheel. Tinsmiths made cages in the design of a mill with a waterwheel.

Another article noted their pet

menagerie was a little bird, flying squirrel, a rattle snack, and frogs. Some tired to teach the birds to sing using a small mouth organ or a flute repeatedly playing to see if the birds would imitate the music. Other fowl creatures such as turkeys, wild geese, pigeons and partridges. They were tamed enough that they would be let out in the morning and return to their shelter in the evenings.

Mammals that were tamed were otters, beavers, which were tamed enough to catch fish and bring the catch to their masters. Racoons were tamed and able to run the streets like domesticated animals but the habit of stealing or killing were an issue especially with poultry. They also liked sugar and sweet things which had to be locked up to prevent theft. They ate with their paws but liked to wash their paws before they ate anything.

An American deer was also tamed so that it ran into the woods during the daytime and returned to its master's home at night. The deer was an especially popular pet in the mid 1700's. In Mr. Miller's article it was noted that European travelers were stunned to see deer with gold collars and neck kerchiefs roaming village streets and through houses.

Newspaper advertisements of lost or runaway deer or people looking for deer to keep for pets balanced with tame deer going into someone's gardens and doing damage and if the owner was found they were to pay for the damages caused by the deer.

Late into the 18th century deer keeping was on the decline as pets. He also quoted Charles Drury "the deer are difficult to tame unless taken

very young and while young they make amiable and interesting pets but as they grow they become a nuisance.

The increase of traffic by horses, horseless carriages and current motor vehicles make it impractical to keep deer in a village, town, or city but they still become pets in the countryside. Colonists were still attached to their domestic cats and dogs as is evidenced in formal period portraits depicting children with their pets in their laps or at their feet. Many families today still have portraits and photos taken with their pets as they are still treated as a family members by most of the families and some families sign greeting cards and send holiday photos with the pets in the picture also.




