### June is Dog License Month!!!

In the State of Connecticut, the month of June is when all dogs over the age of 6 months are required to be licensed. In Lisbon, the Town Clerk's Office processes approximately 385 licenses per year.

A re-licensing reminder is mailed out at the end of May to those who have previously licensed. Fees for registering your dog are \$8.00 for a neutered or spayed dog and \$19.00 for an unaltered dog. If a dog is not registered in a timely fashion, a \$1.00 per month fee is assessed. This is a statutory fee and must be collected by the town.

In order to license a dog, a current certificate of rabies vaccination MUST BE presented. This certificate is provided by the Vet. A rabies tag is not acceptable. Also, if a dog is neutered or spayed, that certificate must also be presented to us.

When a dog is acquired, the new owner has thirty days in which to license it. If a dog's tag is lost, a replacement tag may be purchased for \$.50. If a dog was licensed for the current year in another Connecticut town, a license for the same year will be issued by us for \$1.00. The paper license must be presented as proof of registration.

## Planning and Zoning Commission Quarterly Notes

In recent months the Commission has approved several special permit applications including a construction waste recycling facility at a site in the Lisbon Industrial Park. Site preparation will take several years before construction of the facility can commence. Recycling operations are three to four years out.

Three text amendments to regulations were recently approved. Written and submitted by the Planning and Zoning Commission, two of the amendments clarify the existing underground utility zoning and subdivision regulations by stating that all new utilities shall be installed underground. The third text amendment creates a new regulation to Section 11, Special Permits, requiring a public hearing notice sign to be posted on the property associated with the application. The intent of the Commission is to inform the community of upcoming public hearings, that may be of interest, by augmenting the public hearing notices that are printed in the Norwich Bulletin. All public hearings are for testimony by the applicant and the public.

During the May 1<sup>st</sup> meeting, representatives from Lisbon Landing submitted a change in site plan to add two additional stores next to Michael's, which was formally the Linens n Things space. The change was unanimously approved.

The Planning and Zoning Commission has an alternate position vacancy that must be filled in accordance with Town Ordinance by a member of the town's Republican Party. Contact the Republican Town Committee Chairperson for guidance.

At the dedication, Ken Washburn, Chair., Recreation Committee, thanked all of the volunteers and sponsors. He explained that the vision of the committee has always been to provide recreational activities and create recreation venues for all of the residents, young and old.

The tennis court and dugouts for the baseball field were built with funds from a Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP) grant and the remaining portion of a Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) now DEEP (Department of Energy & Environmental Protection) grant. The 200 meter community track was built with funds from the Local Capital Improvement Program (LoCIP).

The Recreation Committee worked tirelessly to complete their vision by reclaiming/rebuilding the softball field behind the school including dugouts which are an Eagle Scout project.

#### Lisbon Historical Society Quarterly Notes

Once upon a time there was no television or video games, so what did children do during play time, if there was any after the farm and household chores were finished? During the 1800's hoops and graces, hoop rolling, sack races, stilt walking, cup & ball, jacks and hopscotch were just a few play time activities.

Marbles, played by young and old alike, were made of clay marbles for 2,000 years. In 1848 a German glass blower invented a special mold revolutionizing the production process. Children's games were often related to adult work and the youngsters were expected to develop a sense of

cooperation and fair play, to share and learn to play with others.

Adults also had outdoor play including a mid-1800s import from England called Croquet. Croquet was one of the first sports in which women were competitive with men. In 1865 the Newport Croquet Club was established and the American National Croquet League was founded in 1886. It remains a popular outdoor sport today and the only game that ranks men and women together.


The Historical Society plans to open the John Bishop House every Saturday for the summer commencing in June. Take a tour of the house or do a little research with the aid of the extensive materials collated by the Town Historian in easy to access notebooks.

Routine maintenance is ongoing inside the Bishop House, the project list includes painting the front parlor and plaster repairs to the walls and an aesthetically period appropriate freshening of the water closet. Painting of the north side of outside should be completed by the end of the summer.
