September 3rd Apollo 11: In honor of the 50th Anniversary of the first moon-landing, Tom Callinan has developed an entertaining program with original songs, stories and displays of memorabilia related to that and other historic achievements in space. A full-time creative and performing artist for over 40 years Tom has the honor of being Connecticut's 1st Official State Troubadour.

October 1st The Not-so-Good Life of the Colonial Goodwife: *History unsanitized* a zany yet true look at the engrossing "taboo" subjects that are omitted from "herstory". A mother and Daughter duo full of energy and sass present this program that tells it like it really is ... or was. Informative and entertaining be sure to drag him along for the fun!

November 12th Bells of Fire: The Community Handbell Choir based at Central Baptist Church directed by Jane Nolan, will present the history of bells and the development of handbells as we know them today. This presentation includes a mini-concert by the choir that plays throughout southeastern CT and beyond.

December 3rd Soaring Over the Last Green Valley Eagle Update: Back by popular demand Bill Reid joins us with an update on our local eagles. This program explores the history of the bald eagles in the country and describes the unique characteristics of these amazing birds. Information will also be provided on TLGV's role assisting the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection to monitor bald eagle nests and statewide midwinter eagle survey.

January 7th 2020 The Spanish American War and the Ripple Effect in

History: John Haskell, a history professor at Three Rivers explores the facts and issues leading up to the conflict between Spain and the United States in 1898. He then takes it beyond to the ripple effects of this conflict through history.
