Senior Center Celebrates

On June 25th a group of enthusiastic Lisbon residents of a certain age was joined by special guests to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the opening of the Lisbon Senior Center, our local resource and activity center.

The event began with the introduction of the dignitaries seated at the head table by Lee Szruba, serving as Mistress of Ceremonies. They were: Elizabeth Ritter, Connecticut Department on

Aging Commissioner; Cathy Osten, State Senator for the 19th District; Paul Brycki, State Representative for the 45th District; Doug Dubitsky, State Representative for the 47th District; Tom Sparkman, Lisbon's First Selectman; Bob Browne, Lisbon's Second Selectman; and Dan Ostrowski, Lisbon's Third Selectman. Members of Lisbon's Commission on Aging who were in attendance were also introduced, as was the current Senior Center Director Karen Washington.

The delicious luncheon, served by East Coast Catering of New London, was preceded by a toast given by Tom Sparkman. Attendees had a choice of grilled marinated chicken breast with fresh mango salsa or roasted butternut squash lasagna with hazelnut pesto cream sauce, served with fresh salad, garlic rosemary roasted potato and seasonal vegetables. Dessert was a cake decorated with a rendering of the Senior Center building.

A brief speaking program was kicked off by gracious remarks by Commissioner Ritter who emphasized the benefits of having a place where maturing adults could come for information, fellowship, education, or just getting out of the house. With the proximity to the school, it could also serve as a place for inter-generational activities.

Senator Osten and Representatives Brycki and Dubitsky made a joint presentation of a legislative citation recognizing twenty-five years of service to the older citizens of the Town of Lisbon. They expressed their individual congratulations for reaching such a meaningful milestone. It was noted that for most of those years, Judy Jencks served as the Director and Municipal Agent.

The building was built in 1956 and was originally part of Lisbon Central School, at one time housing grades 5 through 8 and then grades 1 through 4. One of the teachers who taught in the building, Carolyn Benker, was in attendance and shared some of her memories. The current Director's office was the office of the school nurse, and the Board Room was the school secretary's office.

Lisbon Historical Society Quarterly Notes

I In late May, LHS tackled a cleanup at the Burnham Tavern to ready the house for the conditions assessment survey and made an exciting discovery behind a wall next to the fireplace. We have been suspecting since we acquired the house that the wall was covering something special, so we very carefully pulled off the wood, and much to our surprise a complete stone and brick bake oven, wood storage space and hand forged iron bake oven door revealed itself! It also turns out the wood covering the bake oven is actually an antique door. Now we are wondering where that came from, as nothing was ever wasted, just repurposed. A follow up investigation on June 7 saw the removal of the bricks covering the original kitchen fireplace revealing the original crane and pintels. Once the kitchen, fireplace and bake oven are fully restored, so will be the heart of the house.

North Burnham Highway travelers may have noticed the limb and tree damage at the Tavern after the June storm. Fortunately, the house did not sustain any injury but the tree wasn't so lucky and had to be fully removed. Our plan is to replace it with a period appropriate specimen when exterior work is completed.

Congratulation to Lauren Zelasky, this year's recipient of the **Lisbon Historical Society Excellence in History** award. A certificate and cash award is given annually to the Lisbon Central School 8th grader with the highest grade point average. We are pleased to recognize Lauren's hard work and interest in history.

LHS member Bethany Arabic is in the homestretch of a major Girl Scout project, working towards the Gold Award, which represents the highest achievement in Girl Scouting. Bethany has undertaken compiling, organizing and scanning over 2,400 photographs of Lisbon's people and places that were scattered among, files, folders, albums and boxes. Once again, the Lisbon Historical Society is hosting a Last Green Valley Walktober walk. The walk this year is titled, Walking the Fields of the Old Burnham Tavern, which will be on Saturday, October 24, 10 a.m. 223 North Burnham Hwy. (Rte. 169).

Walkers will park and gather in the yard of the circa 1760 building. Hosted by LHS member, Ken Mahler, participants will learn about the Burnham Tavern and the present and former farm outbuildings. The group will then proceed to the fields of the 120 acre Town owned property and discuss the challenges and opportunities of farming and maintaining a small farm. The walk will take about 2.5 hours, and covers 2.5 miles. Light refreshments and a restroom facility will be available.

Mourning Rituals

Mourning the loss of a loved one is never easy whether it was in the 1600's or up to the present time. There are many facts and myths and traditions derived from the past history of mourning a death.

The traditions are very different in our modern world. Many people die at home, hospitals, and nursing homes. Many people are killed in traumatic or senseless acts of crimes or in motor vehicles accidents. Funeral homes assist with care of the body, planning the funeral, church services, flowers, cremation, memorial services at the funeral home, and various other needs.

Some people have prearranged services taken care of prior to their death and can express their choices for their type of service, church and music, caskets, headstones, foot stones, plot location in the cemetery and whatever they want on their headstone. Their obituary informs family and friends of their passing, family members and their life history and hobbies.

Some people have cremations and have their ashes sprinkled in some of their favorite places that were dear to their heart and family members. Some families that have a loved one cremated purchase jewelry that allows some of the ashes to be placed in a locket or decorated miniature vial, cross, or other item that is worn to have them close to their heart.

Before cremation there were mourning rings, brooches, and lockets. The loved one's hair would have been placed in these items because the hair did not decay. Hair was used to represent love and loss.

In an article taken from Old Sturbridge Village-Death and Aging,-it is noted that in the early 19th century families and neighbors dealt with the deceased and it had to be taken care of quickly. The deceased was laid out on a table or bed and washed. Some were buried in shrouds or their own clothing. A wooden coffin was quickly constructed. The coffin lay open in the parlor for friends and family to come and pay their respects. Paintings and mirrors were covered. If there was a clock in the home it was stopped at the hour of death or there would be bad luck for the family. Rosemary and Tansey would be set in the room to counteract any odors. Services were held in the home and the coffin was carried by pallbearers or carried by wagon or hearse. The body had to be carried out feet first. If it went head first it could look back and beckon others to follow it into death. The faces of women mourners were covered with veils to shield a tear stained face. It was also a protection from the spirits of the departed who might attach itself to the mourners face. At the freshly dug grave site there would be prayers and hymns, the attending would watch the coffin lowered and covered. After the burial the mourners would return to the deceased's home for food drink and reminiscing the life of the deceased.
