After earning a DMA in Harpsichord from The Juilliard School, John Metz joined the faculty of Arizona State University, where he built an early music program and taught harpsichord for 24 years. He was also Artistic Director of the Connecticut Early Music Festival, and known as a performer and recording artist with "an impressive technique subordinated to a sensitivity to the styles appropriate to the music he played."

Barbara Metz has performed with the Phoenix Symphony, the Renaissance ensemble Musica Dolce, the Phoenix Bach Choir, the Connecticut Early Music Festival, the Eastern Connecticut Symphony Orchestra and in solo recitals in Korea, New York State, Connecticut, Florida, Oklahoma, and South Carolina.
