#### WALK ACROSS AMERICA

As part of our organization's health initiative, Mallory Murray, Director of Education, created a program to keep us moving. Our data collection has shown that our health and wellness activities have increased. Staff and participants in each department wear pedometers when exercising and track their steps. There are five locations throughout the U.S. with a pre-calculated amount of steps to get to each location.

When a department reaches a major destination, they are able to obtain an "educational box" about their destination that may include information about the city, recipes, and sites that

the area is known for. Individual staff and participants receive different colored bands that denote the number of steps they have achieved.

The challenge to "Walk across America" has brought some friendly competition among departments. Currently, Administration is not far from Denver. Education and Residential have reached Chicago! The program has created learning, opportunities to lose weight, lower blood pressure, improve mood, and reunite with friends.





# SELF ADVOCACY CORNER

The past legislative session has been very successful. At the beginning of this legislative session we were struggling to identify legislators who could champion our cause. Now we have an I/DD Caucus - a legislative body of 52 legislators, and growing, who have committed to working with The Arc for the long haul.

Connecticut is the first state in the nation to develop a Legislative I/DD Caucus whose mission and goal is to focus on and promote good outcomes for individuals with I/DD and their families. provide residential supports to 100 individuals in need on the waiting list. This is the first time in many years, in the absence of a lawsuit, that DDS will move a significant number of people off the waiting list and into their own homes.

I continue to facilitate our Youth Self Advocacy Group in collaboration with the Education Department at Cook Hill; we meet the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of every month. Also, this March marked the 3rd year anniversary of our adult Self-Advocacy Group, which meets the 4th Wednesday of each month at our Mechanic Street location. I also have a daytime Self-Advocacy group for our folks at Mechanic Street the 2nd and 4th Thursday of every month.
