The Arc's 20th Annual Rubber Duckie Race

The Arc Quinebaug Valley held its 20th Annual Rubber Duckie Race on Sunday, August 13th in Putnam, in conjunction with Putnam's Car Cruise. With over 3,800 rubber ducks sold for the 20th Annual Rubber Duckie Race, along with event sponsors of various levels and community donations, The Arc Quinebaug Valley grossed over \$20,000.

Major event sponsors for this event included Advantage Resourcing, Putnam Rotary Club and Renewal by Anderson. We need a budget that funds community supports for people with I/DD right **NOW**. The State of CT having NO budget put into place has been devastating for many nonprofits, including The Arc. This has meant furlough days, participants not receiving services they need, employees not being able to work, and the fear of layoffs and programs being cut in the near future. **THIS IS NOT FAIR**. The Arc can provide services to people for less than the state institutions, and they are the **SAME** services. Recently, there was a rally in Hartford to pass a state budget. Our voices were heard, but we still need your help.

A Word From Our Self-Advocate Coordinator:

As you may know, the summer has been very busy as we have gone many days without a state budget. As a result of no state budget, The Arc has had two furlough days that DDS has not funded employment and day services for the people we support. But the good news is due to Governor's Revised Executive Order Resource Allocation Plan, the September 27th furlough day has been eliminated and The Arc will be open.



Our self-advocacy evening group has suffered and been unable to meet due to the furlough days. Most recently, we were able to meet in August. Gene Deary came to this meeting and talked about working in The Arc's Education Department to becoming a Special Education teacher in Waltham, Massachusetts.

Our afternoon self-advocacy groups have been quite busy, as we have started to meet every week. In July, we watched and discussed the CPTV "Building a Great Life" documentary. In August, I gave the presentation I give to the new hires at the agency and in September we will be discussing disability disclosure.

Are you ready for the "Wonder" movie premiering on November 17th? The movie is the story of Auggie Pullman. Based on a New York Times bestselling book, Auggie was born with facial differences that have prevented him from going to a mainstream school. Auggie becomes the most unlikely of heroes when he enters the local fifth grade. As his family, his new classmates, and the larger community all struggle to find their compassion and acceptance, Auggie's extraordinary journey will unite then all and prove you can't blend in when you were born to stand out.


