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In This House Comes Home to New London with October Premiere at the Garde Arts Center

Hartford-based Judy Dworin Performance Project and the New London community collaborate to make history with theater, dance, discussion and community participation



(Hartford | New London, CT) New London's own 1678 Joshua Hempstead House – one of New England's oldest and most historically well-documented houses – is the setting and central character of Judy Dworin Performance Project's *In This House*, premiering on Thursday, October 13, at 7:30 p.m. at the Garde Arts Center, 325 State Street, New London.

A contemporary and engaging mix of dance, song and multimedia, *In This House* begins with the true story of the Hempstead House, its owner Joshua Hempstead and his enslaved African American resident Adam Jackson. The story moves through three centuries – and subsequent

generations of Hempsteads – detailing their evolution from slave owners to passionate abolitionists who worked to create the integrated and interracial New London of today.

Through a meaningful and graceful reflection on the house, the land, the imprint of slavery and its abolition, *In This House* seeks to provoke, challenge and engage audiences to pursue a world that bridges the racial divide.

"When we think about slavery in this country, we often think of it as a Southern phenomenon," creator and choreographer Judy Dworin said. "But slavery was very much a Northern institution as well. The journey from slavery to contemporary questions of race, racism is compressed into the story of this very old frame house that is still so full of vibrant energy. This family and this house have inspired a volatile and probing journey through history bringing us face-to-face with where we are today."
